Water is a natural resource for which we are all responsible.

Access to water is a universal human right.

Averting a Water Crisis

Over 1.2 billion people worldwide are without access to a safe drinking water supply, and almost 2.4 billion people lack basic sanitation services. More than 5 million people die every year from preventable water-related diseases.

Pollution from domestic, industrial and agricultural sources affects the quality of drinking water and functioning of ecosystems. Climate change and variability are having a profound impact on rainfall distribution and many regions of the world are experiencing unprecedented extreme droughts, floods and storms, with severe economic and social consequences.

The global water crisis is a threat to economic development, to the environment and to security. Rational management of water resources is key to sustainable development; solving water problems will lead to progress across the economic, social and environmental dimensions of sustainable development.

Conflicts over water, especially the hundreds of transboundary rivers and aquifers, may intensify as resources become increasingly scarce and contaminated in developed and developing countries alike.

Confirming the Goals

The international community is committed to the Millennium Development Goals (2000) and Johannesburg World Summit targets (2002), to halve, by 2015, the proportion of people who do not have access to safe, affordable drinking water and basic sanitation, as a first step towards the ultimate goal of universal access.

Meeting the Goals

To meet these goals, it is crucial that water issues be considered as a top priority on local, national and regional agendas.

Funding is a major challenge. The financial needs of the water sector are estimated at \$180 billion per year, compared to the \$80 billion per year currently being invested. It is therefore compulsory that financial solidarity and commitment become operational at local, national and international level.

It is urgent that the human right to water for life and health be guaranteed by international law and that all nations enforce its implementation.

The World Assembly of Water Wisdom

In 2001, the International Secretariat for Water, Green Cross International, the Maghreb-Machreq Alliance for Water, and the Water Supply and Sanitation Collaborative Council launched a worldwide process of democratic debate and knowledge sharing about the global water crisis. The *World Assembly of Water Wisdom* initiative, originally inspired by the International Secretariat for Water, held its first meeting during the 3rd World Water Forum in Kyoto in 2003.

The Assembly is composed of 60 "Water Sages", including elected officials, civil society, opinion leaders, youth, investors, representatives of local, national and regional governments, international organizations, and private, public and para-public sector service suppliers.

The *World Assembly of Water Wisdom* will meet for the second time in Barcelona during the Universal Forum of Cultures, May 31 – June 1, 2004, to discuss water issues and to adopt the Fundamental Principles of a *Global Convention on the Right to Water*, as proposed by the first Assembly of Water Wisdom.
